1.1 General trends

As expected, woodland management took up the largest proportion of our time and thanks must go once again to our volunteer group who braved some rather long periods of wet weather to assist with woodland management work, such as: weeding conifers, put up nest/bat boxes, monitor boxes, planting trees & assisting with survey work. Total volunteer time in the project during the reporting period was 2,667 hours which equates to £23,860 added value.

1.2 Woodland Management

- Upper Cree: Planting of the remaining 30% of broadleaves completed this year. A total of 154,000 broadleaves have been planted over 3 years. Over 200ha of conifer regrowth in total throughout the project have been removed along the watercourses and in other areas to create planting opportunities.
- Doonhill Wood: conifer thinning, thinning of broadleaves (sycamore/beech), creation of habitat piles, felling of dangerous trees, path clearance, red squirrel survey, litter picking, dyke repairs, chemical weed control, ivy control on trees, update of Management Plan.
- Blairmount Park: path upgrades (314m), fence repair, conifer thinning, thinning of broadleaves (sycamore/beech), creation of habitat piles, felling of dangerous trees, red squirrel survey, litter picking, dyke repairs, ivy control on trees, update of Management Plan.

- **Duncree Wood**: Selective thinning of broadleaves, creation of habitat piles, litter picking, removal of scrap car/domestic waste, chemical weed control, update of Management plan.
- Nursery: Seed collection, production/care of seedlings, including S.lapponum, maintenance of polytunnel, weeding of raised beds, etc.
- Garlies Wood: Wildlife surveys
- Low Camer: birch thinning, path strimming, path upgrade, siting of new nature signs, felling of conifer regrowth, siting nest/bat boxes.
- **High Camer**: maintenance of nature/partnership signs, wildlife surveys, path & picnic site strimming, siting nest/bat boxes.
- Water of Trool: Wildlife surveys.
- Holm Wood: Water vole habitat improvements, planting, siting bat/bird boxes.
- Caldons: Rhododendron control
- Buchan: Maintenance of deer fence, rhododendron control, holly management, chemical treatment of bracken
- Glenhead: Monitoring nest boxes, collecting acorns.
- Knockman Wood: Putting up nest/bat boxes, sowing bank-side wild flower seed, rhododendron clearance, weeding around planted trees in deer exclosures, bracken control.
- Montane Scrub project: Maintenance of Demo garden
- Volunteer programme ARC, Volunteer Action Scotland, Supported Employment Service, Turning Point, Aberlour Child Care Trust, CVCWT volunteers.
- Maintenance of raised seed bed at Daltamie for oak and birch seedlings.
- Health and safety risk assessments prepared for woodland projects.
- Monitoring ASNW sites for UKBAP species.
- Attendance at Green Shoots Forum, LBAP forum, deer management discussions with FCS.
